About Good Shepherd Penn Partners:

- A Pennsylvania Limited Liability Corporation formed in 2007
- Majority owner: Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Network (GSRN) of Allentown, PA
- Minority owner: University of Pennsylvania Health System (UPHS) of Philadelphia, PA
- Business: Inpatient and outpatient physical rehabilitation and long-term acute care
- Non-profit 501(c) 3 organization

Operations:

- 58-bed inpatient rehabilitation facility (IRF) located at Penn Medicine at Rittenhouse at 1800 Lombard Street, Philadelphia. UPHS consolidated its inpatient rehab units at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania (HUP) and Pennsylvania Hospital into this new rehabilitation hospital. The new facility added 16 beds to UPHS's previous inpatient rehabilitation bed count.
- 38-bed long-term acute care hospital (LTACH) located at Penn Medicine at Rittenhouse at 1800 Lombard Street, Philadelphia. This is a new level of care for UPHS that enables patients to stay in the system for post-acute care.
- Administrative offices located at Penn Medicine at Rittenhouse, 1800 Lombard Street.
- Outpatient centers located in Philadelphia, Radnor, and Glenside in Pennsylvania and Cherry Hill and Westampton in New Jersey.
- Bedside rehabilitation services at UPHS's acute-care hospitals.

Penn Medicine at Rittenhouse:

- Address: 1800 Lombard Street, Philadelphia
- Site is owned by UPHS.
- Good Shepherd financed the renovation of 3 floors plus administrative space, located on the corner of 19th and Lombard streets. Good Shepherd also financed equipment and other start-up costs.
- Remainder of 6-story building and the other buildings on the Penn Medicine at Rittenhouse campus are utilized by UPHS services.

Jobs:

- All rehabilitation staff members are employees of Good Shepherd Penn Partners. Physicians are employees of UPHS.
- Approximate number of jobs created with the opening of the LTACH and new Good Shepherd Penn Partners administrative staff: 115
- Expected number of FTEs to be employed by Good Shepherd Penn Partners by its first year of full operations: Approximately 414

Oversight:

- 7-person Board of Trustees, with 4 members from Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Network and 3 members from UPHS
- Good Shepherd Penn Partners has its own management team and staff, including executive director Michael Soisson; nursing executive, Frank D. Sites, MHA, BSN, RN; therapy executive Robert Cullen, PT, JD, MBA, LLM; long-term acute care hospital administrator Robert Norwicke, MBA; and inpatient rehabilitation facility administrator Lisa A. Haney, PT.
- Good Shepherd Penn Partners holds the license for the LTACH and the outpatient sites. The Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania holds the license for the IRF.

Benefits for Patients:

- Enables patients to stay within the University of Pennsylvania Health System for their post-acute care, ensuring a continuity of care.
- Expands the range of rehabilitation services beyond those previously offered by UPHS, including inpatient rehabilitation for traumatic brain injury and spinal cord injury and disorders.
- Creates synergy by two national leaders in rehabilitation care that benefits patients in the Philadelphia area and in the eight counties currently served by Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Network. A fusion of the two organizations' intellectual and clinical strengths permits Good Shepherd Penn Partners to offer excellent comprehensive rehabilitation and long-term acute care.

Partnership Benefits for Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Network:

- Advances Good Shepherd's mission and strategic direction to bring its patient-focused brand of rehabilitation care to more people in a larger geographic region by managing Good Shepherd Penn Partners' inpatient rehabilitation and LTACH units, outpatient centers and the bedside rehabilitation at UPHS's acute-care hospitals.
- Enables Good Shepherd to draw upon the research and medical school resources of UPHS, one of the leading academic medical systems and research institutions in the country. (UPHS physical medicine and rehabilitation senior residents perform 10-week rotations at Good Shepherd's Allentown campus.) Allows Good Shepherd to enhance its research capabilities and establish teaching and educational opportunities at its Allentown campus.

What Is a Long-Term Acute Care Hospital?

Long-term acute care hospitals (known as LTACHs) provide specialized acute care to medically complex patients. Patients are commonly admitted from an acute-care hospital's intensive care unit with complex medical conditions that require continuous care. LTACH patients are typically too medically fragile or involved to be discharged to home, not medically stable to undergo rigorous inpatient rehabilitation care, and/or continue to need a higher level of care than can be provided by a skilled nursing facility or home health care. The national average length of stay at an LTACH is more than 25 days.

What Is Inpatient Rehabilitation Care?

Inpatient rehabilitation care offers rigorous post-acute physical, occupational and speech therapy, as well as nursing, dietary, psychology and other allied services for conditions such as stroke, traumatic brain injury, spinal cord injury, orthopedic disorders, limb loss or multiple trauma. Care is overseen by physical medicine and rehabilitation physicians (also known as physiatrists).

What Is Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation (PM&R)?

Physical medicine and rehabilitation (also known as physiatry) is a branch of medicine devoted to the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of neurological, musculoskeletal, cardiovascular, pulmonary and other disorders that may produce temporary or permanent impairment and associated functional disability. PM&R provides care for a broad spectrum of disorders, including multiple trauma, brain injury, spinal cord disorders and injuries and stroke. PM&R physicians also are typically trained in the management of patients with limb loss, gait abnormalities, a wide variety of musculoskeletal disorders (such as neck, back and limb injuries), and both acute and chronic pain. PM&R also focuses on restoring function to people with problems ranging from physical mobility limitations to those with complex cognitive impairments.
